



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

Program was hosted by Miss. Prathiba, M. Pharma Pharmaceutics with brief introduction about guest speaker.

IPR (Intellectual Property Rights) refers to the legal rights that protect the creations of the mind, such as inventions, literary and artistic works, and symbols, from unauthorized use by others. Some of the common forms of IPR include patents, copyrights, trademarks, and trade secrets. Compulsory licensing is a provision under certain IPR laws that allows the government or a third party to use a patented invention without the consent of the patent holder, usually under certain conditions such as public interest or national emergency. This can be done in exchange for payment of reasonable compensation to the patent holder. The purpose of compulsory licensing is to balance the interests of the patent holder with the needs of the public and to prevent anticompetitive practices. Intellectual Property Rights (IPR) refer to the legal rights that protect the creations of the mind, such as inventions, literary and artistic works, symbols, names, images, and designs. These rights allow creators and owners of IPR to control the use of their creations and prevent others from using them without permission. Compulsory licensing refers to a legal mechanism that allows a government to grant permission to use a patented invention without the









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consent of the patent owner, usually under specific circumstances such as a national emergency or lack of access to essential medicines. Compulsory licensing aims to balance the interests of the patent owner and the wider public by allowing access to necessary and affordable goods and services. Intellectual Property Rights (IPR) refer to the legal rights that protect creators and owners of original works, such as inventions, literary and artistic works, symbols, names, images, and designs, from unauthorized use and replication. Compulsory licensing is a type of IPR license that is granted by a government and mandates that a particular patented product or process be licensed to other parties without the consent of the patent owner. This is usually done to address a public health crisis, promote competition, or address anti-competitive practices. It is important to note that compulsory licensing is a controversial topic in the field of IPR, as it limits the ability of patent owners to control the use of their inventions and can negatively impact their incentives to innovate. Intellectual Property Rights (IPR) refers to the legal rights that protect the creations of the mind, such as inventious, literary and artistic works, symbols, and names. IPR provides creators and owners of these works with exclusive rights over their use, production, and distribution. Compulsory licensing is an exception to this exclusivity, where the government allows use of a patented invention or copyrighted work without the permission of the owner. This is usually done for reasons such as public health, security, or for preventing anticompetitive practices. The government may require the owner to license the work to a third party, or the government may license it directly. The terms and conditions of a compulsory license are established by law and are intended to balance the interests of the owner and the public. Intellectual Property Rights (IPR) refers to the legal rights granted to creators, inventors, and owners of original works, such as patents, trademarks, copyrights, and trade secrets. These rights help protect the owner's creation and give them exclusive control over its use, production, and distribution. Compulsory Licensing refers to a government-granted authorization that allows someone other than the rights holder to produce and sell a patented product or use a patented process without the permission of the patent owner. This is typically done in cases where the patent holder is not producing the patented item or is not allowing others to use it, and the government wants to ensure that the public has access to the product or technology. However,





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compulsory licensing is subject to certain conditions and limitations, and is only exercised in exceptional circumstances.

After the talk there was student interaction with speaker. To the students question the speakers has answered all of them by guiding them to progress in their carrier.


Objectives:

Summary

Mallige College of pharmacy has organized a seminar on hands on training on handling of laboratory animals on 14th august 2021 in Auditorium at 11.00 pm

Guest speaker gave detailed information on handling of laboratory animals. Information about how to approach animals, choice of appropriate methods to pick up, carry and restrain the animals was given. Further he explained about correct positioning of both handler and animals so that animals need to feel secure and animals should be completely immobile to avoid struggling. Then he said that picking up mice by tail induces aversion and anxiety in animals. Handling tunnels and cupping methods are the other two methods used instead of picking up by the tail. Information on different methods to handle different species were given. He also explained about the temperature, humidity, ventilation, light, feed cleaning and sanitation, waste disposal, vermin control, anaesthetizing animals and different euthanasia methods. He explained about the duties of staff which includes managing the laboratory animals, in order develop sense of security, and learn the minimum amount of force required to safety hold or restrain various species. He informed that Successful handling requires the ability to recognize animals state of mind, which may include bewilderment, apprehension and in some case discomfort of pain, and also said to prevent the use of gloves whenever possible.


